Rocket Alumnus Takes The Lead at UToledo

Matthew J. Schroeder '98 was named interim president during a special Board of Trustees meeting in April and began his tenure on May 20, 2024. He is only the third Rocket to serve in the role.

The lifelong Toledoan attended UToledo because of the school's reputation for a quality, affordable education. Schroeder worked at a local country club during high school and interacted with business leaders from northwest Ohio who were Rocket alumni. Their success proved to Schroeder that UToledo would provide a solid foundation to launch his career.

Schroeder's long history with UToledo is guided by his desire to work for a mission-driven organization that also supports his community. His career began in development with the Medical College of Ohio, one of UToledo's historic medical institutions. He later joined The University of Toledo Foundation serving as vice president of real estate and business development and chief operating officer as well as serving as a liaison to the Foundation Board of Trustees. Through this role he increased scholarship and endowment fund utilization, among other achievements.

Schroeder made his way to UToledo's main campus spending four years guiding strategy and government relations as chief of staff to former UToledo President Sharon L. Gaber before stepping into his previous role as executive vice president for finance and administration and chief financial officer overseeing the finance, budget, facilities, auxiliaries, information technology, human resources, public safety and compliance functions.

Schroeder agrees that his time as interim president has been a "full circle moment" as a Rocket. "Having the opportunity and the ability to help reposition the University as the regional force powering opportunities to learn, care, work and play is, especially at this point in Toledo's history, very humbling," Schroeder said. "I am honored the Board of Trustees placed their confidence in me to lead our institution during a time of great opportunity."

Schroeder also recognizes the strength of UToledo alumni network. "Our alumni are UToledo's greatest ambassadors," he said. "They have gone on to change the world. UToledo has an obligation to engage and support them throughout their entire life." What we hope, in return, is that alumni will continue sharing their Rocket experiences with those around them, helping spread the positive impact and accomplishments happening on our campuses and in our beloved city.

The power of UToledo's teaching, research and care is highlighted through the stories of faculty experts, successful students and alumni, and dedicated staff through slice of life photography and bold type in headlines that pull TO DO out of UTOLEDO for strong, impactful messaging.

The launch of the new brand also features a new identity for UToledo's clinical operations under UToledo Health, which is the brand framework for all healthcare operations that take place at The University of Toledo Medical Center or a UT Physicians clinic. "In The Power To Do, we have created a new brand identity that is both authentic and aspirational to tell the UToledo story in ways that will inspire more students to unlock their potential on our UToledo campuses and encourage more of our community members to receive the absolute best care from our UToledo Health physicians and providers," said Meghan Cunningham, vice president for marketing and communications.

UToledo worked with BVK, a Milwaukee-based marketing firm, to develop the new brand through market research that included 26 stakeholder interviews, more than 1,600 survey respondents and several focus groups.

The Foundation will continue this partnership, helping to leverage BVK's existing knowledge of our brand to expand this impact to a new campaign that will support student success and the Rocket legacy well into the future.

HONORING ALEGACY OFLEADERSHIP

Recognizing More Than 33 Years of Service

Always quietly leading by example, Brenda Lee has been at the helm of The University of Toledo Foundation since 1991. Her guidance has led the Foundation through numerous challenges impacting higher education through the years, but her unwavering dedication and expertise has continued to steer the organization to ongoing success.

Originally serving as director of administrative services and as the Foundation's first, full-time employee, she can truly say she has helped build the organization, impacting countless lives by working to continue the UToledo legacy and supporting the organization's mission to provide an affordable education for our students.

Joel Epstein, Foundation emeritus trustee, was instrumental in hiring Brenda for her initial role and shared, "When Brenda arrived she did not know some of the challenges she would face. Despite these, Brenda managed them with exceptional composure. Regardless of the burden on the Foundation or the evolving nature of our structure, Brenda has undoubtedly proved to be the ideal candidate for the role."

In 1993, she was promoted to executive

director and in 2003 was named president of the Foundation. During several points in her tenure, Brenda also served as interim vice president of institutional advancement, overseeing alumni and development efforts in 2001-2002, 2014 and 2016-2017.

Over the past three decades, assets under management by the Foundation have grown from \$30 million to more than \$700 million; the number of funds managed has also increased from 500 to over 2,300. Brenda was also instrumental in the merger of the UToledo Foundation with The Medical College of Ohio Foundation in 2007.

"Brenda is a leader who has the respect of the entire community. Her decision-making balances what is best for the Foundation and the University. The best in philanthropic leadership," said Vern Snyder, former UToledo vice president for advancement.

Brenda has not only been recognized for her incredible impact on campus, but has also been honored by her peers. In 2004, the University community honored Brenda with the Alice H. Skeens University Outstanding Woman Award. The award was named in honor of prolific leader, Alice Skeens, who served the university for nearly five decades as a professor, administrator and advisor, recognizing women providing outstanding service and leadership. A fitting honor for someone who dedicated much of their career to supporting the programs and resources that help students gain the most from their UToledo education.

The Council for Advancement and Support of Education (CASE) announced Brenda S. Lee as one of only two recipients for the 2024 CASE Commonfund College and University Foundation Award.

The award recognizes individuals who have made valuable contributions through best practices, distinguished service and volunteer leadership to the college and university foundation field. The award is presented each year at the annual CASE Conference for College and University Foundations.

"The UToledo Foundation would not be what it is today without Brenda's unwavering dedication to the University and our students," Interim President Matt Schroeder said. "We simply cannot thank her enough for building up this organization to provide the critical support needed to advance UToledo."

Not only has Brenda continued to serve the University community but she has been a strong supporter of the greater Toledo community as well. Past volunteer work in the region includes AAA of Northwest Ohio, Diocese of Toledo Finance Council, Big Brothers Big Sisters, Claire's Day Inc., Gesu Parish Finance Committee, Gesu School Council, Hospice of N.W. Ohio, National Committee for Institutionally Related Foundations, St. Joseph Parish Finance Committee, St. Ursula Academy Foundation Board, Toledo Opera, Sunset Retirement Communities and YWCA. Her active role in northwest Ohio shows her dedication to the region and proves her influence extends well beyond our campuses.

"Brenda has been an instrumental part of the Foundation for many years. Her presence will be greatly missed, but her impact will be felt for years to come," said Floyd Akins, vice president for advancement.

UToledo Program Has Powerful Momentum

The University of Toledo launched Rocket Kids in February 2023. The program recruits and trains current students and recent graduates from across the country to provide quality child development and care at military bases across the globe.

Housed in the Judith Herb College of Education (JHCOE), Rocket Kids is supported by a \$11.5 million, fiveyear grant through the Department of Army Installation Management Command-Europe NAF. The Program is a transformational learning experience, where students gain practical knowledge for programming and leadership covering topics like health and wellness, creative and performing arts, literacy, outdoor recreation and STEM among others. Interns receive more than 45 hours of training and certifications before they can be placed for travel overseas.

During its inaugural year, 26 students participated in leading educational and recreational programming on three bases in Germany and one each in Belgium, Italy and the Netherlands. In December 2023, two additional training sites were added, Indiana State University and San Diego State University, as well as an online program, training more than 50 new participants between them. These additional access points increased interest and participation. More than 75 students were divided across nine bases in Germany, Italy, Belgium and the Netherlands in 2024.

"College students are taking notice of this unique opportunity to serve children while exploring the world," said Dr. Sammy Spann, creator of Rocket Kids and vice president of student affairs at The University of Toledo. "It was incredibly exciting to see more than three times as many interns this past summer, and we're even more excited to continue that momentum going forward with new training opportunities."

UToledo advocate and supporter, Judith Herb, had the unique opportunity to partner with Rocket Kids and witness the impact firsthand. She shared, "I am currently overjoyed that this program is underway based in the JHCOE at The University of Toledo. Dr. Spann is the perfect person, with the history, to lead this program for our students that participate and those that represent other universities and colleges. Across the nation, I have witnessed many students that said what a life-changing experience this program was."

Dr. Rebecca Schneider, acting dean for the Judith Herb College of Education, also witnessed the impact of this program. "Visiting the sites in person makes a world of difference in understanding the program and what our Rocket Kids get to experience. I was really impressed by the support provided by the military staff. The students seem to really value this opportunity with several making plans to return next year," she said.






